# Laodicea: The Apathetic Church Revelation 3:14-22

# **Getting Started**

- ❖ "321 Restore" is an effort to have each of us engage with the Mission of our church at
  the most elemental level. We PRAY for "3" people in Brevard County with whom we
  interact on a regular basis and want to see Jesus do a work of redemption and
  restoration in their lives. We pray that of those three people, God will provide
  opportunities for us to BEFRIEND and deepen our relationship with at least "2" of them.
  And of those two, we are asking God to give us the opportunity to tangibly INVITE "1" of
  them into a relationship with Jesus.
  - Of those three steps--- Pray, Befriend, Invite--- which one is most intimidating to you?
  - Do you have 3 people in your life in right now with whom you interact with on a regular basis for whom you are praying? Share those people with your group.
     If you don't have 3, then begin to ask God to bring more people into your life who need Christ.

# **Digging Deeper**

- \* Read Rev. 3:14-22 and discuss and answer the following:
  - In our western mindset, "hot and cold" denotes spiritual vitality but Jerry pointed out that Jesus never wishes His followers to be spiritually "cold". Rather Jesus was speaking to their effectiveness and usefulness to the Kingdom or lack thereof.
    - What do you see as the basic reason for their ineffectiveness?
    - In your own life have you see things (e.g., attitudes, actions, habits, grace disciplines, etc.) that encourage or hinder your effectiveness for the Kingdom? What are they?
    - Do you agree that material prosperity can encourage a spirit of selfsufficiency within us and result in growing disconnected from Jesus and every increasing Kingdom apathy?
    - o How do we combat self-sufficiency in our lives?
- ❖ In Col. 4:16 Paul instructs the Colossian church to share his letter to them with the church at Laodicea? Presumably some of the same heresies and doctrinal issues were plaguing both churches. Read Col. 1:15-20 and discuss the heresy that had entered into these churches.

# Think About It

Regarding the letter to the church at Laodicea, John R.W. Stott has written: "Perhaps none of the seven letters is more appropriate to the twentieth century church than this. It describes vividly the respectable, sentimental, nominal, skin-deep religiosity which is so widespread among us today. Our Christianity is flabby and anemic. We appear to have taken a lukewarm bath of religion" (What Christ Thinks of the Church [Grand Rapids: Eerdmans, 1980], 116, quoted in The MacArthur New Testament Commentary: Revelation 1-11 [Chicago: Moody Press, 1999], 137). The church at Laodicea was composed of religious hypocrites. They claimed to know the Lord but in reality were only playing religious games. How can you be sure that you are not a Laodicean Christian?<sup>1</sup>
