Life in the Spirit: Help with Suffering, Part 1 Romans 8:18-25

Getting Started

- This passage speaks to creation and nature's pain due to the Fall. In the garden, humanity received from God the "creation mandate" which calls on us to be stewards of His creation. What are you views on environmentalism and creation care? How do your views affect your decisions, your purchases, your politics, or your actions?
- Opening Prayer Time: Who do you know in our church or community who is going through a time of suffering? Begin your prayer time by interceding on their behalf. (Note: We will pray for group member burdens and trials at later.)

Digging Deeper

- ❖ Reread and discuss Romans 8:18-25.
 - This passage greatly focuses on the future aspect of the gospel. The gospel is past (Christ's ministry, death, and resurrection), present (the Spirit's work in our lives), and future (the glory to be revealed at Christ's return). Study the passage and identify which elements are past, present or future.
 - Rom. 8:19-22 demonstrates how creation plays an important role in the story of God's redemption in this world.
 - How would you summarize what this passage is teaching about creation in your own words?
 - How does the biblical perspective on creation in this passage critique those who do not give thought to how they treat environment? How does it critique those who make creation care the main cause of their lives?
 - Based on this passage, how might you inject the gospel into a conversation about environmentalism?
 - How does recognizing your inheritance in God change your view of: money and wealth? relationships? the many or few opportunities you have in life?
 - The sermon highlighted verse 18 for many reasons but one of the reasons is how it portrays suffering as being "worth it".
 - Look through the sermon text together as a group: where does the "worth-it-ness" of suffering appear in these verses? What lessons on this does Paul draw from creation in particular?
 - How would someone with a "worth-it-ness" approach to suffering respond to hardship compared to someone without that approach? What would be different in emotional response? Effect on relationships? Effect on one's purpose in life?

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Applying this sermon to Our Lives

- o Not groaning?
 - Is life going well for you right now? Praise God! But how is that affecting your longings for heaven? Do you find yourself so satisfied with life that you don't always long for heaven? Why?
 - Do you have unresolved issues in this life that causes you to not look forward to heaven relationships, lack of impact, regret? What would be a Christ-centered way to process those things so that you can begin to long for heaven?

Think About It!

Knowing what Christ went through, we might be tempted to question whether the suffering is worth it. Maybe serving the flesh is the better route after all. Paul quashes this idea by stating that our present battle against our sinful flesh is nothing in comparison to the glory that awaits us. Suffering sounds so ominous from our perspective, and it is. But if we exchange our short-sighted view for a long-range perspective, we'll see that what lies in store for us—and we will have no doubt that what we endure in this lifetime will be worth it in the long run. Praying Together

This week share with one another areas of suffering and tribulation being experienced by group members and pray for one another. Depending on the situation, discuss whether the group needs to care for a member in an extraordinary way.


