Getting Started

Digging Deeper

- ❖ Read Habakkuk 1 and let's discuss some aspects of the text and sermon
 - Jerry pointed out that Habakkuk begins very differently than other prophetic books. How do most prophetic books begin? What is the benefit of the way Habakkuk begins?
 - This book was written 2600+ years ago. How do the first 4 verses give it a "modern" feel? What parallels do you see in Habakkuk's situation and our national environment?
 - Read verses 5-17 and note all the phrases and terms that describe the Babylonians. What picture of is painted of this Empire?
 - How do you reconcile God using such an Empire for the chastisement and judgement of Israel?
 - In Habakkuk's second prayer in verses 12-17, what resonates with you the most?
 - What questions does this chapter create in your mind?

Read Isaiah 45 in its entirety.

- Survey the verses and note everything they say about God and about God's sovereignty over difficult situations in our lives.
- What do these verses teach us about God's purposes in fearful times?
- Does this passage reinforce randomness and chance or intentionality and goodness in how God interacts with us?
- How does this chapter touch on what God promises in Habakkuk 1 relative to the Babylonians?

- ❖ What was your biggest takeaway from the message this week?
- Do you cry-out to God with the transparency and emotion of Habakkuk or are you more reserved? If you pray like Habakkuk, is this beneficial to you? If you do not, what holds you back from coming to God in this way?
- What in the message either challenged or encouraged you the most? Why?
