Micah 5:1-6 – Advent Hope – Study Notes & Questions

<u>Icebreaker</u> – share a favorite Christmas memory or family tradition.

Key Ideas for discussion

- Biblical hope desires something good for the future, is confident that it will happen, and lasts until it is fulfilled. (Hebrews 6:11)
- Hope that does not last beyond your lifetime is no hope at all! We need a hope that goes beyond the grave.
- We need a hope that will weather our failures and our successes, our bad times and our good.

Takeaway Truth: True Hope is in an eternal person – Jesus and all that He promises.

Questions for discussion/application

- 1. Proverbs 13:12 Hope deferred makes the heart sick. Have you experienced "hope deferred"? In what way? How did it make you feel?
- 2. It is easy to rest our hopes on things that are near term and of this world, rather than on Christ. Share from your own life some of these false objects of hope. How can you grow in the ability to shift your gaze from the temporal to the eternal?
- 3. Tim Keller asserts that "You and I are unavoidably and irreducibly hope based creatures. We are controlled how we live now by what we think will happen latter. Christian hope has to do with the ultimate future, not the immediate. How are your actions today being controlled by what you think will happen in the future?
- 4. How is faith related to hope? (Hebrews 11:1).
- 5. What promises of God are you looking forward to being ultimately fulfilled?
- 6. We live in the tension of the already and not yet. This means that in Christ we already possess every spiritual blessing but practically speaking, we don't fully experience the fullness of these blessings yet. Share some of the blessings of Christ that you are truly experiencing. How complete are these blessings?
- 7. In Micah 5:2, Jesus is described as coming from Bethlehem, "too little to be among the clans of Judah". What is the historical significance of Bethlehem (who else came from there)? What do we learn about God that he would choose such an insignificant town to birth the Savior of the world? (cross-reference 1 Corinthians 1:26-31)
